The Integrated Development Project Burundi-Rwanda, a hope for satisfactory agricultural production



n Tuesday, May 20, 2025, the Ministry of Environment, Agriculture, and Livestock launched the Integrated Development Project Burundi-Rwanda (BRIDEP) in Bujumbura. The project aims to increase productivity in priority sectors such as rice, maize, and the breeding of pigs and poultry, as reported by the Burundian Press Agency on-site.

During the project launch, the BRIDEP Coordinator, Mr. Bonaventure Gakukwe, indicated that the project includes components aiming at improving productivity through the development of marshlands, hillside irrigation, and the establishment of processing and marketing infrastructure for agricultural products. He further explained that the integrated development project incorporates several innovations, with efforts particularly focused on developing agro-poles in Karusi and Cibitoke, specifically in the expanded provinces of Bujumbura and Gitega.

Regarding the agro-parks, Mr. Bonaventure Gakukwe mentioned that there will be complementary processing units, while additional service units will be created. He also added that these units will serve as a hub for producers, both public and private, who will bring their products to these centers for processing, which he described as a novelty for the country and the region.

Concerning other innovations introduced by this project, he noted the development of a public-private partnership approach, which represents a new concept in the agricultural sector, along with the estab-



lishment of new institutions and legislation to operationalize various activities involving different stakeholders.

The Coordinator of the Integrated Development Project Burundi-Rwanda also stated that this project will benefit the country and its population, with both sides gaining from the results.

The population will work under better conditions and will receive support in terms of knowledge, inputs (seeds, fertilizers, etc.), and the provision of new, more productive and resilient breeds of pigs and poultry that are well-suited to the region. He also assured that during the duration of the project, production will increase, particularly that of potatoes, which will be intensified using genetic material and selected seeds.

It is worth noting that this project will create support mechanisms such as infrastructure focused on developing value chains, including 2 agro-poles, 7 processing units, storage areas and hangars, the development of marshlands (6,000 hectares), the protection of watersheds (18,000 hectares), and the rehabilitation of roads (60 km) to facilitate market access and cross-border transport.

The project will also support the digitalization of fertilizer distribution systems, he noted. (ABP)

The exam is taking place in 15 centers spread across the country, with 2 located in the city of Bujumbura and 13 in other provinces. The Assistant to the Minister of Public Health and the Fight Against AIDS urged the students to work calmly, to avoid any form of cheating, and to ask questions if they have any doubts about certain wording in the questionnaire. It is worth noting that this exam will take place over 9 days, from May 21 to May 30, 2025. (ABP)

Voter card distribution: CENI calls for final mobilization



n Tuesday, May 20, 2025, the spokesperson for the Independent National Electoral Commission (CENI), Mr. François Bizimana, called on all citizens who have not yet collected their voter cards to go to the nearest Independent Communal Electoral Commission (CECI) office by June 2, 2025, at the latest.

In a press briefing, Mr. François Bizimana indicated that, in general, the distribution of voter cards has been suc-

cessfully carried out across the entire national territory. Out of a total of 5,963,917 cards prepared, 5,914,498 have been effectively collected, resulting in a distribution rate of 99.17%. He noted that there are still 39,419 cards (or 0.83%) to be retrieved.

According to the spokesperson for the CENI, the results of the card distribution at the provincial level are encouraging: Buhumuza 98.58%, Burunga 98.58%, Butanyerera 99.28%, Bujumbura 99.45%, and Gitega 99.66%.

Regarding voters who have lost their cards, he stated that they must present their registration receipt in order to receive a new card. The Independent National Electoral Commission congratulated all citizens for their mobilization and encouraged those who are delayed to complete this process as soon as possible so that they can

participate in the legislative and communal elections scheduled for June 5, 2025. (ABP)

Towards Better Management of Tourist Sites in Burundi



n Tuesday, May 20, 2025, the Director General of Tourism in Burundi, Mr. Jacques Bigirimana, called for better management of the country's tourist sites to transform them into genuine drivers of economic development.

The Director General proposed that the sites currently managed by local municipalities or the Burundian Office for Environmental Protection (OBPE) be transferred to the Ministry of Commerce, Industry, and Tourism. According to him, this reorganization would enhance the value of these locations and increase their attractiveness.

This statement was made during a meeting dedicated to the development of a marketing plan for tourism in Burundi, a strategic document aimed at promoting the country's image internationally. The plan seeks to unveil Burundi's tourism potential, its natural and cultural wealth, and to provide concrete solutions to the current challenges facing the sector. "It is time for tourist sites to be managed by competent structures so that they can be valued appropriately, in line with the vision of Burundi as an emerging country by 2040 and a developed country by 2060," stated the Director General of Tourism.

He expressed his surprise that some tourist sites remain outside the management of the relevant Ministry, which hinders their development. A unified management approach would not only attract more tourists but also generate foreign currency revenue for the country.

The marketing plan also aims to correct the negative image often portrayed on social media. For Mr. Jacques Bigirimana, it is urgent to showcase a different, more positive side of Burundi by highlighting its tourist assets and positioning the sector as a pillar of the national economy. (RTNB)

A team from the steering committee of the multisectoral platform for food security and nutrition is visiting some communes to assess the progress of the malnutrition prevention project



n Wednesday, May 21, 2025, a team from the steering committee of the Permanent Executive Secretariat of the Mul-

tisectoral Platform for Food Security and Nutrition (COPIL/PMSAN) conducted a field visit to assess activities carried out at the community level in the communes of Ndava and Gisozi, as part of the project "Prevention of Malnutrition among Children, Adolescents, and Women in Burundi," funded by the Dutch Government through the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), as reported by the Burundi News Agency on-site.

During this visit, the representative of the Permanent Executive Secretariat of the Multisectoral Platform for Food Security and Nutrition, Mrs Béatrice Ndayishimiye, stated that the country is strongly committed to enhancing food security and nutrition for the population through synergistic multi-actor interventions that can yield tangible results, ensuring the country has a human capital capable of producing for sustainable socio-economic development.

In Ndava commune, members of the steering committee of the Permanent Executive Secretariat of the Multisectoral Platform for Food Security and Nutrition (SEP/PMSAN), along with officials from non-governmental organizations, visited a school nutrition club at the Fota Communal High School, where they engaged with student members. Various testimonies were shared regarding the importance of these school nutrition clubs and their impact on nutritional behavior as well as their

families'.

The students reported noticeable changes in their respective families and communities. They also visited a savings and credit association called "Kamaro k'ingaburo ibereye" on Bugera Hill, which received laying hens for the campaign as well as various seeds. At this site, a culinary demonstration was organized to teach the members of this association how to prepare a complete meal that promotes good health.

The visit concluded with a stop at the savings association "Tugarukire ibibondo" on Kiyange Hill in Gisozi commune. It is noteworthy that the project has a duration of six years (2023-2028) and aims to improve access to nutritious, safe, affordable, and sustainable diets. (ABP)

arents are unavailable due to current life circumstances, which preencouraged to Additionally, insufficient breast milk and poor-quality breast milk may lead parents to resort to cow's milk, for proper which is widely accessible.

According to this nutritionist, cow's milk can serve as a complementary food starting at a certain age, typically around one year. However, some effects may be observed, including allergies, as some children may develop an allergy to cow's milk proteins, resulting in skin rashes or digestive issues due to lactose intolerance. This can also cause bloating, abdominal pain, or diarrhea, not to mention anemia if milk consump-

tion is excessive.

Iron deficiency may also occur since milk does not contain enough iron and can interfere with its absorption. Nutritionist Mrs Sylvie Habarugira urged parents to watch for any signs of allergy or intolerance (such as skin rashes, abdominal pain, or diarrhea) that arise after drinking milk.

If a child cannot tolerate cow's milk, parents are advised to use alternatives such as almond, soy, or

oat milk, ensuring they are fortified with nutrients and that the child's diet is diverse and balanced, including healthy proteins, carbohydrates, and fats.

In cases where a child experiences issues related to cow's milk consumption, it is advisable to consult a pediatrician or allergist for an accurate diagnosis and tailored advice. Some foods, such as leafy green vegetables, legumes, nuts, and seeds, are rich in calcium and iron and support the proper growth and development of the child. (ABP)

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
