



Burundian Head of State receives Kenyan President's special envoy in audience



The President of the Republic of Burundi, His Excellency Evariste Ndayishimiye, received in audience on Monday, February 9, 2026, at the Ntare Rushatsi Presidential Palace, the Honourable Fatuma Zainab Mohammed, Kenyan Member of Parliament elected from the Migori County constituency and Special Envoy of the President of the Republic of Kenya, His Excellency William Ruto.

The Honourable Fatuma Zainab Mohammed brought a message of fraternity from the Kenyan President to his Burundian counterpart, wishing him prosperity and the strengthening of bilateral relations between Burundi and Kenya,

as well as cooperation at the regional level.

In addition to these wishes for fraternity and the consolidation of bilateral and regional relations, the Kenyan President's special envoy also conveyed a message in which His Excellency William Ruto congratulated his Burundian counterpart, His Excellency Evariste Ndayishimiye, in anticipation of his assumption of the presidency of the African Union.

regard to freedom of expression, the organization of elections and the peaceful coexistence of different political parties, including those in opposition, at a time when Burundi and Kenya are preparing to hold elections next year.

President of Burundi travels to Addis Ababa for the 39th Ordinary Session of the African Union



The President of the Republic of Burundi, His Excellency Evariste Ndayishimiye, left the country on Thursday, February 12, 2026, for Addis Ababa, the capital of the Federal Republic of Ethiopia, where he took part in the 39th Ordinary Session of the Assembly of Heads of State and Govern-

ment of the African Union (AU), scheduled for 14 to 15 February 2026.

An official communiqué from the Office of Information, Communication and Spokesperson for the President of the Republic of Burundi stated that during this session, the Burundian Head of State will take over the presidency of this African organization. The same communiqué specified that the President of the Republic of Burundi will be accompanied by the First Lady of Burundi, H.E. Angeline Ndayishimiye.

It should be noted that this annual AU meeting brings together the continent's leaders to discuss major political, economic and security priorities. It also provides a strategic framework for defining Africa's common orientations. **(ABP)**

Burundian Head of State has been promised massive international support

On the eve of taking office as head of the African Union for the year 2026, the President of the Republic of Burundi, His Excellency Evariste Ndayishimiye, met on February 13, 2026 in Addis Ababa at the headquarters of the African Union with several prominent figures who expressed their unwavering support for him as head of this prestigious African institution.

On the sidelines of the 39th Ordinary Session of the Assembly of Heads of State and Government of the African Union, President Ndayishimiye met with United Nations Secretary-General Antonio Guterres in Addis

Ababa. They emphasized the importance of peace and security in Africa in general, and in the Great Lakes region in particular.

The Burundian Head of State then met with the Chairperson of the African Union Commission, Mahamoud Ali Youssouf, who praised Burundi's contribution to stabilization efforts in eastern Democratic Republic of Congo and Somalia.

The Burundian leader also met with Dr Sidi Ould Tah, President of the African Development Bank Group (AfDB), in Addis Ababa, a meeting that provided an opportunity to



celebrate the strong partnership between the AfDB and Burundi.

President Ndayishimiye also received His Eminence

Cardinal Fridolin Ambongo Besungu, President of the Symposium of Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar (SECAM), who expressed the support of the Catholic Church and promised to visit Burundi in the near future.

He also met with Ms Diene Keita, Ms Nyaradzayi Ngumbonzvanda and Cheik Niang, respectively Executive Director of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), Deputy Director of UN Women and Special Envoy of the President of Senegal.

Finally, President Ndayishimiye took part in the meeting of the African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM), one of the most ambitious instruments that the African Union has put in place to promote good governance on the continent. **(Presidency)**

Burundi participates in the 5th meeting of CDC Africa



On Monday, February 9, 2026, the Vice-President of the Republic of Burundi, Mr Prosper Bazombanza, chaired the fifth meeting of the Committee of Heads of State and Government of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC) via videoconference in the afternoon.

According to the Burundian Vice-President, the purpose of the meeting was to examine ways and means of mobilizing the resources needed to deal with epidemics breaking out across the African conti-

ment. He took the opportunity to warn that Mozambique is currently experiencing high rainfall, a situation that has led to an outbreak of cholera in that country.

Mr Bazombanza reassured that the Africa Centers for Disease Control and Prevention is already organizing itself to support Mozambique in the fight against this epidemic. He also expressed his satisfaction with the support provided by this institution to Burundi. He emphasised that this is a source of pride for Burundians, as Burundi has greatly benefited from the support of Africa CDC, particularly in strengthening human resource capacities and equipping district hospitals, institutes and other health facilities.

For his part, the Director General of Africa CDC, Dr Jean Kaseya, said that African states lose more than 50% of their health resources due to several challenges, including inadequate digitalization systems and heavy dependence on imported health products. He called on African countries to join forces to enable the continent to produce its own vaccines and medicines locally. **(Embassy of Burundi in Algeria)**

Towards the renovation of Gitega National Museum

On Thursday, February 12, 2025, Burundian Prime Minister Nestor Ntahontuye received a delegation from UNESCO accompanied by Burundian princess Esther Kamatari. The delegation had just visited the National Museum in Gitega and wished to present the Burundian gov-

ernment with an overview of this tourist site.

During an interview with the press, the spokesperson for the Prime Minister, Mr Moïse Nkurunziza, said that the delegation, led by Ms Krista Pikkat, Director of Culture at the United Nations Educational, Scientific and



Cultural Organization (UNESCO), had come in response to Princess Esther Kamatari's request to UNESCO to promote various tourist sites. UNESCO therefore sent its team to assess the condition of these tourist sites and to discuss their renovation with the

Government of Burundi. Mr Nkurunziza revealed that the Prime Minister warmly thanked Princess Esther Kamatari for this initiative, before expressing his gratitude to UNESCO for sending a delegation of specialists in tourist sites and cultural heritage, as well as for the cooperation that exists between Burundi and UNESCO since 1962.

The Prime Minister of Burundi stated that this delegation's visit was timely, as the Burundian Government had just decided to allocate a budget for the development of five tourist sites, as stipulated in pillar four of the 2040-2060 vision. He asked UNESCO to present a concept note outlining what UNESCO is prepared to do and what it is asking of the Burundian government, so that they can join forces to renovate the National Museum in Gitega. It should be noted that the same delegation was received by the Vice-President of the Republic of Burundi, Mr Prosper Bazombanza. **(ABP)**

President of the Senate receives the President of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in audience



On Monday, February 9, 2026, at the Burundi Senate Liaison Office in Bujumbura, in the Mukaza commune, surrounded by his two Vice-Presidents, the Right Honorable Gervais Ndirakobuca, President of this Institution, received in audience the President of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC), Ambassador Pierre Claver Ndayicariye.

The purpose of this audience was to bring to the attention of the Upper House of Parliament the activity report for the 2024-2025 financial year, which focuses on the list of people murdered and disappeared during the 1972 genocide.

Ambassador Ndayicariye pointed out that the list contained in the report is not exhaustive because, on the one hand, some families have disappeared completely



and information about their disappearance is almost impossible to obtain. On the other hand, some people are afraid to testify for fear of intimidation from those around them.

This report will be presented to Parliament in session to better inform Burundian citizens about what happened in 1972. **(Burundi Senate)**
